# **Construction Trades** (Construction Worker)

Construction Worker/
Pre-Apprenticeship......29-57-71

This course prepares students to meet the entry level requirements for apprenticeship trades. This course provides instruction in the relationship of personal and interpersonal skills development to employability, orientation to apprenticeship and apprenticeship preparation, thinking and problem solving skills in the workplace and apprenticeship mathematics. All participants will be exposed to various construction trade applications.

Prerequisites: Must be a minimun of 17 years of age.

Length of Course: 10 weeks. (Class begins: Sept. 7 and Nov. 8, 2004).

# Landscaping

Landscaper/Pre-Employment ......24-05-70

This course provides skills for employment in the landscaping and nursery industry. Includes instruction in landscape design, landscape maintenance and construction, equipment, tools, safety, plant maintenance, plant identification and terminology, irrigation and drainage systems, techniques of propagation and transplanting, and control of insects and diseases. Instruction also develops entrepreneurial skills through monthly plant sales and growing vegetable crops for profit. Hands-on training included.

### Locksmith

# 10-week classes begin Sept. 7 and Nov. 8, 2004

Locksmith/1......29-61-81 This course prepares students for proper key identification, duplicating,

and cutting from codes. This course also includes fundamental skills involved in disassembly of key-in-knob type locksets.

Prerequisites: Physical ability to do the work and ability to secure a bond upon employment.

Length of Course: 10wks. days/Two semesters evenings.

This course offers a review of entry level skills and provides instruction in more advanced locksmithing skills, such as assembly and disassembly of locks, the use and maintenance of padlocks, combination locks and intermediate code machines, and rekeying locksets. A working knowledge of automobile locks is presented. Students will also gain knowledge of builder's hardware and door and frame construction as they relate to the technology of locksmithing.

Prerequisites: Successful completion of Locksmith/1 (29-61-81) or equivalent ability as evidenced by the instructor. Physical ability to do work, and no record which prevents obtaining a police permit to do locksmith work in Los Angeles.

Length of Course: 10wks. days/Two semesters evenings.
